Prayer: Confiteor

I. Sacrament of Reconciliation:

- Scriptural sources of Confession & Reconciliation:
 - The Healing of a Paralytic (<u>Lk 5:17</u>)
 - Parable of the Prodigal Son (<u>Lk 15:11-32</u>)
- The Celebration of the Sacrament of Penance (<u>CCC 1480</u>)
 - "Like all the sacraments, Penance is a liturgical action. The elements of the celebration are ordinarily these: a greeting and blessing from the priest, reading the word of God to illuminate the conscience and elicit contrition, and an exhortation to repentance; the confession, which acknowledges sins and makes them known to the priest; the imposition and acceptance of a penance; the priest's absolution; a prayer of thanksgiving and praise and dismissal with the blessing of the priest."
- Per <u>CCC 1465-1467</u>, the priest:
 - "is fulfilling the ministry of the Good Shepherd" (<u>CCC 1465</u>)
 - "is not the master of God's forgiveness but its servant" (CCC 1466)
 - "is bound under severe penalties to keep absolute secrecy regarding the sins his penitents have confessed to him" (<u>CCC 1467</u>)

- Note: to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation, one must be in a state of grace (<u>CCC 1310</u>)
- Michael: "Confession is a beautiful thing, that is one of the significant graces of being a Catholic"

II. Rosary

- Has origin in "prayer beads" which helped keep count in prayer recitation
- The beads were originally know as "Paternosters" as they were used for recitation of the Lord's Prayer (in Latin, "Pater Noster")
- Also used to recited the "Jesus Prayer":

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the Living God, have mercy on me a sinner

- St. Dominic in 1208 had a vision of the Virgin Mary who gave him a rosary and told him to use it to convert souls.
 - At the time St. Dominic was working against the "Albigensian movement", which rejected the Sacraments and followed "gnostic" beliefs of the "demiurge," or fight between the divine and the spiritual
 - = a form of "dualism" that denies the triune, Christian Godhead
- Notes:
 - "Our Lady of the Rosary" refers to the appearance of Mary to St. Dominic
